The third submission, "Sisterhood and Authenticity: The Experiences of Generation Z Sorority Women in National Panhellenic Council (NPC) Chapters" was submitted by Pietro Sasso (Delaware State University), Kim Bullington (Old Dominion University), and Melissa



Bidinger (Lindenwood University). This qualitative study examines how NPC sorority members who are Gen Z describe their connectedness through a sense of belonging and their own generation. Two themes emerge and recommendations for practice are offered to encourage recruitment and leadership development for authentic conversations in fraternity/sorority life.
